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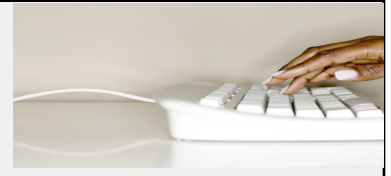

Introductory Sentence Citations:

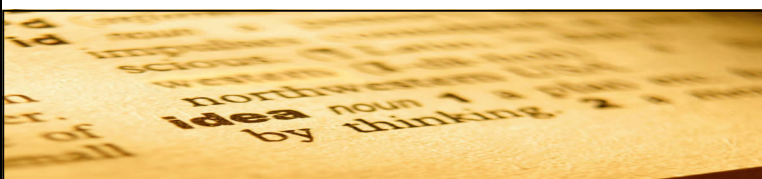
According to Vance, “the Princess Diana tragedy triggered an international backlash against the paparazzi” (99).
